Results from the latest (1998) Employer Survey showed that ninety-three percent of employers surveyed "agreed" or "strongly agreed" that HIM Program graduates were well prepared in the four subject areas.</p> <p>1b. Results from the latest (1998) Alumni Survey showed that one hundred percent of graduates "agreed" or "strongly agreed" that they were well prepared in the four subject areas.</p> <p>2. One hundred percent of last year's graduates (1999) received an overall rating of at least "Very Good" on the final clinical evaluation.</p> <p>3. For each of the past five years (1995-1999) eighty-five percent of students have scored at or above the passing score on the national Registration Examination administered by the American Health Information Management Association. This year (1999) the percentage was 92% according to the report received from the testing service (Applied Measurement Professionals).</p>	<p>1a. Target met.
